



The establishment background of the college

Gurudayal Government College is one of the renowned colleges of the country. This



college has a rich and noteworthy history in terms of academic and extracurricular achievements.
Gurudayal Government
College was the first institution for higher education in

then Kishoreganj subdivision. At the inception, it was named Kishoreganj College. Based on the initiative of eminent philanthropist and lawyer Mr Zillur Rahman, Mr Khan Bahadur Abdul Karim, also an influential social and political figure, took the lead to establish a college for spreading education in the region. The first committee constitutes of Mr Sadat Hossain Chowdhury, Sub Divisional Officer as the President and Mr Abdul Wadud Chowdhury and Bipin Roy as Joint Secretary, Mr Shah Abdul Hamid and Dr Prafulla Chandra Bir as Members and some local educational philanthropists.

At the initial stage, for the first two years, the college conducted its academic and administrative activities in a nearby establishment of Jute Research Institute called C & B Bungalow. Then Gurudayal Sarkar, a great soul, though a fisherman by profession came forward with a generous donation of fifty thousand taka to purchase the present land with a view to establishing a permanent campus. The college authority renamed the college after his name in recognition to his great contribution.

Though the college was HSC centered initially soon it introduced BA (Pass) Course under University of Dhaka in 1945. Dr Dhirendra Lal Das, and later an eminent educationist Muhammad Wasimuddin took over the charge of the Principal

respectively and achieved great acclaim for academic success including first position and merit places in BSc (Pass) Examination under University of Dhaka. The college was nationalized on 1 March 1980 as an acknowledgement for its outstanding achievements.

The mission is to spread the light of higher education to the poverty-stricken and struggling Haor population.

The vision is to ensure quality education and develop the college as a center of excellence for higher education.








The chart shows that pass rate in Degree, Honors and Masters is 100%. In Preliminary Masters the pass rate is 99.76%.

2.1: Key achievements and highlights of the year of the college Academic:

2.3: Highlights of Student Activities of the Year:

Academic:

 Classroom Attendance: After the renovation and reformation done by CEDP students are attending class at a higher rate. Students feel encouraged as teachers are using technology and other teaching techniques in the classroom.

Extracurricular:

- Sports: Gurudayal Govt College won the Champion trophy in inter-college cricket championship under Dhaka education Board.
- Cultural Activities: Inter department cultural activities were arranged in the college.
- Pitha Utshab and Flower Festival: The college arranged Yearly Pitha Utsab and Winter Flower Festival which created much enthusiasm for the students.
- Social Activities: BADHON, the blood donation club run by the students of this college, voluntarily worked for communities inside and outside the college and established an inter-district network of blood donation activity.



In 2022-23, they arranged donation of blood for 1654 patients in Kishoreganj, Netrakona, Mymensing, Sherpur and Jamalpur. At the same period, they offered the service of blood grouping for

- more than 2200 people and enlisted new 786 donors.
- Humanitarian Aid: The members of BADHON, beside their blood donation programs, organized humanitarian aid and food for more than 100 families in price-hike situation involving general students.

2.4: Key achievements and Highlights of the Year of Institutional Development Grants (IDG):

5 OTM packages, W1, G1, G2, G7 and G8 were completed through e-GP system. Package W2 was carried over to FY 2022-23 due to some unavoidable situation.

Package G1 and G2 which included procurement of office equipment like Desktop, Laptop, Printer, Scanner and Photocopier and G 8 included Furniture and Fixtures for classrooms, conference hall, lab and library. Package G7 covered the procurement of AC for smart classroom and labs.

9 classrooms were decorated with newly procured smart desks and chairs, side racks and tables that heightened the classroom environment attracting the students more than ever. Other furniture includes Almirah, Table Swivel Chair and Sofa and those were installed in department offices and college office.

Package W2 included renovation of classrooms, library, offices and conference hall. Package W2 was initiated through e-GP system and was carried out successfully. 

Chart 2: Teachers by Gender



